BEEF CATTLE HERDSMAN AWARD

The Missouri State Fair will award two \$80 awards, plus attractive plaques, to the herdsmen in charge of the two most outstanding beef cattle exhibits. A committee will make inspections to determine the winners. The following points will be considered: 1) cleanliness, grooming, and appearance of the exhibits; 2) handling of feed, equipment, etc. and keeping same out of the alleys; and 3) cooperation, courtesy, and sportsmanship in the exhibit area and show ring

The 2022 Beef Cattle Herdsman award was presented to Rocking F Polled Hereford and Circle S Shorthorn.

Best-Kept Beef Cattle Exhibit Barn

The Missouri State Fair will award a plaque, to be hung in the Beef Cattle Office, to the breed that has demonstrated and presented its entire exhibit barn and is considered by the committee to be the best-kept barn during the course of the Fair. The following points will be considered: 1) cleanliness, grooming, and appearance of the exhibits; 2) handling of feed, equipment, etc. and keeping same out of the alleys; and 3) cooperation, courtesy, and

sportsmanship in the exhibit area and show ring. The Best-Kept Beef Cattle Exhibit Barn in 2022 was Gelbvieh and Santa Gertrudis.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

NoteAll exhibitors, except beef cattle, must bring their own bedding during the Note

additional feed and bedding will not be available for purchase during the Fair. Beef cattle exhibitors will be provided Premium Missouri Mulch bedding for \$10 per head to be paid along with entries. No other bedding will be al-

lowed for beef cattle including sawdust, pellets, etc. Dairy cattle exhibitors may continue adding straw to the bedding. All exhibitors should practice good environmental stewardship, keeping the bedding clean and free of glass, plastics, cans and other trash for the purposes of the Fair's recycling agreement.

- Exhibitors must comply with all general rules and regulations and animal 1 health requirements for exhibitors in this premium book.
 - Violation of these rules may result in any or all of the following: A. Withholding or return of payment for the animal or exhibit,
- premiums and awards. B. Suspension from future exhibiting at the Missouri State Fair for a length of time to be determined by the Missouri State Fair Commission or the Director of the Missouri State Fair on behalf of the Commission. Suspensions can be for any length of time and may be permanent.
- C. Probationary exhibiting at the Missouri State Fair for a length of time and under such terms and conditions to be determined by the Missouri State Fair Commission or the Director of the Missouri State Fair on behalf of the Commission.
- D. Assessment of any other penalty determined by the Missouri State Fair Commission or the Director of the Missouri State Fair on behalf of the Commission.
- All entries must be received by July 3.
- When there is only one (1) exhibit in a class, the exhibitor will receive half of the premium money for the placing awarded by the judge.
- 4. The Missouri State Fair does not guarantee premium money, merchandise, prizes or special awards. Because the State Fair Commission is without constitutional or statutory authority to borrow money for its operation, it reserves the right to prorate premium money because of state budget restraints.
- All group classes must be pre-entered by July 3 in order to show. Individual animals shown in all of the group and herd classes listed must have been entered and shown in one of the classes for single animals. This includes Junior breeding cattle. THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS.
- Entry fee for 4-H/FFA Breeding Beef Cattle will be \$11.00 per head, DOES NOT enter the juniors into the Open show; OPEN Breeding Beef Cattle will be \$20.00 per head. Entry fee for 4-H/FFA Steers, 4-H/FFA Market Heifers and Crossbred Heifers will be \$15.00 per head. The Missouri State Fair will provide bedding in the barn for all beef cattle exhibits. Bedding will not be furnished for the tie-out area.

- 7. Any party desiring to make a late entry will be able to do so by paying \$20 per head for Open Breeding Beef Cattle and \$11 per head for 4-H/ FFA Breeding Beef Cattle; and \$25 per head for Open Carcass Steers; and \$15.00 per head for 4-H/FFA Steers, 4-H/FFA Market Heifers and Crossbred Heifers, along with the entry fee. This can be done up to July 25, 2023.
- 8. Any herd owners desiring to come on grounds or set up their stalls before the arrival date, as stated in the catalog, must check with the Beef Cattle Superintendent. If an exhibitor plans to request an "early release" in order to show at another fair, it will be necessary to have a copy of the entry in that fair, or a letter from the fair stating that the exhibitor has made an entry with them.
- Application for entry in purebred classes must show registry numbers of each animal entered. No application will be accepted until this information is received.
- 10 Substitutions will be allowed on the basis of a heifer for a heifer and a bull for a bull, regardless of age within a breed, per exhibitor.
- All display or Exhibit beef breeds will be under the supervision of the 11. Beef Superintendent and must remain on exhibition throughout the entire fair. There will be \$20.00 charge per head.
- All money is offered only in open competition. No exhibitor will be 12. permitted to make more than two entries in any one class.
- 13. All livestock exhibitors may purchase exhibitor passes according to the fee schedule in the front of this book. Remittance for passes must be sent with entry.
- Stalls, feed and bedding information may be found in the general rules 14 of this catalog. Superintendents will not require feed releases. 15. Any stalls not used by exhibitor but paid for by the exhibitor will be
- forfeited to be used at the discretion of the Beef Cattle Superintendent for stalling of other cattle. Any refund requests must be received prior to July 3.
- 16. Stalls are for cattle only. No feed or tack may be stored in stalls.
- All beef cattle exhibitors should enter GATE 4. 17.
- No trucks or trailers will be permitted to park behind the beef barns except while loading and unloading. After unloading, livestock trailers may park in Restricted LotA, west of Gate 4. Vehicles found in restricted 18. areas without the proper hang tags are subject to towing at owner's expense.
- 19. Beef tie-out gates will be closed daily at 8 a.m. and opened at 7 p.m. Cattle may be led to tie-out areas after 7:00 p.m. and must be returned to stalls by 8:00 a.m. Any cattle remaining in the tie-out area after 8 a.m. will not be allowed to enter the grounds.
- 20 The tie-out area will open August 6 at noon for Angus, Charolais, Gelbvieh, Hereford, Simmental and exhibition cattle. No space may be reserved for any other breed, steers, market heifers or crossbred heifers, prior to August 12. Any exhibitor doing so will be disqualified from exhibiting with no refund and will be ineligible to exhibit at the 2023 Missouri State Fair.
- Limited exhibitor camping is available by reservation. The tie-out 21. area will open August 6 at noon.
- 22 All cattle must be in their respective places on the arrival date as stated in catalog.
- 23. All health papers are to be delivered to the Beef Cattle Superintendent at times designated.
- 24. No grooming chutes will be allowed in the show barns except on show day.
- 25 No power washers will be allowed on wash rack.
- Fans: All fans will be pointed in the direction indicated by arrows on 26. the wall or stall.
- No Port-a-cool units allowed on the Missouri State Fairgrounds. Only 27. self-contained misters will be permitted on the fairgrounds.
- 28. No artificial filling of any cattle will be allowed on the Missouri State Fairgrounds. No pumps will be allowed on the Missouri State Fairgrounds. Violation of this rule will result in disciplinary action.
- 29. There are to be no nurse cows on the fairgrounds. 30. ALL BULLS 1 YEAR OF AGE AND OLDER MUST SHOW WITH A NOSE LEAD. Entry into the show ring without one will be an automatic disqualification. The right to disqualify from the show any animal deemed unmanageable is reserved by the Beef Cattle Superintendent and Staff.
- There will be no dogs allowed in any barns whether on a leash or in a cage. There will be NO exceptions.
- 32. Failure to comply with the above regulations will result in the forfeiture of any or all premiums won.
- 33. When 9 or more head entered and checked into any single class, the class shall be split, as determined, by age, by the Beef Cattle Superintendent and staff.
- Exhibition requirements for cattle, bison, and exotic bovids
- Intrastate (cattle in Missouri moving within Missouri for exhibition only).
 - No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required. а
 - b. All cattle must be free of clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease
 - Brucellosis no test or vaccination is required.
 - d Tuberculosis - no test is required.
- Interstate (cattle from another state entering Missouri for exhibition only).
 - a. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required and all livestock must be individually identified by official ear tag or tattoo and individually listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

b. Brucellosis

- Cattle from Brucellosis-Free States i.
 - All sexually intact cattle may enter without a brucellosis 1. test.
 - 2. Steers. No brucellosis test required but must be individually identified and listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- ii. Sexually intact cattle from brucellosis Class A states
 - All test eligible animals must be tested negative for 1. brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, except
 - 2. Cattle from a certified brucellosis-free herd. The certified herd number and the date of the last test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection;
 - Steers. No brucellosis test required but must be individu-3. ally identified and listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection; and
 - Rodeo bulls from a Class A state than must have a negative brucellosis test within twelve (12) months prior to exhibition.
- c. Tuberculosis
 - Beef cattle from Tuberculosis-Free states
 - All beef cattle two (2) months of age and over (including steers) may enter without additional testing requirements 1 or entry permit.
 - ii. Beef cattle from Tuberculosis Status-less than free states. must meet the following requirements:
 - 1.
 - Must obtain an entry permit. Must have a negative tuberculosis test within sixty (60) 2. days prior to shipment, and the test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection; or Move from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd (herd test
 - 3. date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection): or
 - 4 Move directly from a herd of origin that has had one (1) complete negative herd test within one (1) year (date of herd test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection).

Section P

American Black Hereford Show

- Rules
- 1.
- All Missouri State Fair rules apply. Animals competing in the Black Hereford Show must be registered in the American Black Hereford Association herd book and recorded 2. in the name of the exhibitor 30 days prior to the Missouri State Fair registration deadline.
- 3. Cattle must be entered under the recorded ownership 30 days prior to show. Jointly owned animals must be entered under the multiownership (all co-owners) in the individual classes.
- All animals must be properly tattooed and will be inspected at the show. 4 Tattoos must be legible and must match registration papers. Any animal upon check-in, which does not have legible permanent identification mark (ear tattoo) corresponding to the permanent identification on the registration certificate is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible permanent identification mark, animals cannot be retattooed and rechecked at the show.
- Altering the conformation or natural appearance of the animal is prohibited. This includes covering of white skin and the use of artificial 5. tailheads, switches, or any use of false hair. Other prohibited products include illegal or unlicensed pharmaceuticals, or artificial filling. Any animal found in violation will be barred from showing.
- Any winning animals in any and all divisions may be subject to DNA Parentage Verification (sire and dam only). If discrepancies in parentage are found the animal may be subject to forfeit its winning position and prize money premiums.
- 7. All cattle must meet the health requirements set out by the Missouri State Fair. Any deviation will be just cause for immediate disqualification from the show.
- All bulls one year of age and older must show with a nose lead. The 8 right to disqualify from the show any animal deemed unmanageable is reserved by the show management.
- Any person found guilty of misrepresentation by the show and sale committee including the age of the animal, or not abiding by the show rules, will be disqualified and denied the privilege of show. Case may be referred to the ABHA for further action according to association procedure.
- 10. The registered owner and/or exhibitor must be a member in good standing with the ABHA.
- 11. Judges will have no preview of competing cattle or meeting with show exhibitors prior to the show. This is to maintain impartiality for all competitors and judge.
- 12. Classes are subject to change based on the number of entries.
- 13. Show management reserves the right to split large classes if deemed necessary.

Classes

Cow/Calf (Any female older than the below ages with a calf at side.) a) Calf older than 240 days of age on the show date is not eligible to show in cow-calf class.

b) If the cow is horned and the calf polled, then the pair shows in the horned cow-calf class, and if the cow is polled and the calf is horned, then the pair shows in the polled cow-calf class. c) Calf is eligible for individual classes but must be entered in the appropriate class. d)Cow-calf does not compete for overall champion female.
